

MICHIGAN STATEWIDE VOTER SURVEY 600 SAMPLE – REGISTERED VOTERS DETROIT REGIONAL CHAMBER 2025 MACKINAC POLITICAL SURVEY

May 11, 2025

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METHODOLOGY

The Glengariff Group, Inc. conducted a Michigan statewide survey of registered voters. The 600 sample, live operator telephone survey was conducted on May 5-8, 2025 and has a margin of error of +/-4.0% with a 95% level of confidence. 17.3% of respondents were contacted via landline telephone. 82.7% of respondents were contacted via cell phone telephone. This survey was commissioned by the Detroit Regional Chamber.

KEY FINDINGS

Early Differences Appear In 2026 Motivation to Vote; Dems More Motivated Than GOP in Early View

Registered voters were asked two ways how motivated they were to vote in the November 2026 election: (1) Ranking their motivation on a one to ten scale and (2) Whether they planned to definitely, probably or probably not vote.

On a scale of one to ten they were asked how motivated they were to vote. The higher the number the greater the motivation to vote. Overall, voter motivation eighteen months out sits at 8.8 on a 10.0-point scale. The chart below compares motivation to past elections.

Strong Democratic motivation is nearly a half point higher at this stage than Strong Republican motivation.

The chart below compares May 2024 motivation to vote to May 2025 motivation to vote by party. Republican motivation to vote has fallen sharply. Democratic motivation to vote has seen an increase.

Registered voters were asked if they definitely plan to vote, probably plan to vote, or probably/definitely will not vote.

66.4% of registered voters said they will definitely vote.

23.8% of registered voters said they will probably vote.

5.9% of registered voters say they will likely not vote.

3.8% of registered voters simply did not know if they would vote.

[Note: In 2022, Michigan voter turnout was 55%.]

The chart below looks at the percentage of voters by party that say they are definitely voting in 2026. At this early stage, Strong Democratic voters are 8.4 points higher in definite votes compared to Strong Republican voters.

Differences between 'registered voters' and 'definite voters' appear throughout this survey as a result of early higher motivation to vote among base Democratic voters.

Generic Ballot Test Statistically Even Among Registered Voters; Moves to +2.2% for Dems Among Definite Voters

In a generic ballot test among all registered voters, a generic Republican held a .8% lead on a generic Democrat at 38.3% Republican to 37.5% Democrat.

But among definite voters that advantage shifted to 41.3% generic Democrat to 39.1% generic Republican – a 2.2% advantage for the generic Democratic candidate.

Majority of Voters Say Economy On the Wrong Track at 53.6%

A majority of registered voters say the nation's economy is on the wrong track by a margin of 36.5%-53.6%.

Only Republican voters say the nation's economy is on the right track. Independent voters say the nation's economy is on the wrong track by a margin of 29.1%-57.3% -- a 2-1 margin.

Trump Job Approval Hovers Around 46%; Strong Disapproval Higher Than Strong Approval

President Donald Trump's job approval stands at 46.4% approve to 47.3% disapprove among registered Michigan voters. **31.9% of voters STRONGLY APPROVE** of his performance while **40.6% STRONGLY DISAPPROVE** of his performance. 6.3% of voters had no opinion on Donald Trump's performance.

But among DEFINITE voters, President Trump's job approval falls to 44.1% approve to 50.2% disapprove – underwater by 6.1%.

Independent voters disapprove of President Trump's performance by a margin of 37.3%-46.4% - underwater by 9.1%.

Of particular note: 91.4% of Strong Democratic voters strongly disapprove of President Trump while 70.7% of Strong Republican voters strongly approve of President Trump.

But President Trump continues to have nearly unanimous approval among Strong Republican voters at 93.3%.

Party affiliation and gender are the primary driving differences in President Trump's job approval.

Men approve of President Trump by a margin of 57.0%-36.7%. But women disapprove of President Trump by a margin of 36.6%-57.1%.

The chart below compares Trump approval levels by whether voters think the economy is on the right track or wrong track. Economic wrong track sharply increases among those voters who only 'somewhat approve' of President Trump's performance.

The Deeply Unusual Numbers of Mike Duggan

Independent candidate Mike Duggan has deeply unusual numbers for two reasons:

Duggan's numbers are deeply bifurcated between Metro-Detroit and out-state Michigan.

In Metro Detroit, Mike Duggan's favorable number is 21.4-points higher than Jocelyn Benson and 21.7- points higher than John James. Mike Duggan's favorable in Metro Detroit is equal to Governor Gretchen Whitmer's favorable numbers.

But in out-state, Mike Duggan has only 31.2% name identification. Duggan's name id in out-state is 35.7-points lower than Tudor Dixon, 31.0-points lower than Jocelyn Benson, and 23-points lower than John James.

The second way that Mike Duggan's favorable numbers are deeply unusual is that each partisan affiliation views Mike Duggan favorably. No other candidate in this survey shows a similar pattern of all party affiliations viewing them favorably. The chart below looks at Duggan's favorable/unfavorable by party affiliation.

This survey tested a series of combinations of candidates for the 2026 Governor's race. Every Republican candidate was tested against Jocelyn Benson and Mike Duggan. Every Democratic candidate was tested against John James and Mike Duggan

Again, Mike Duggan's Highly Unusual Numbers

In every Gubernatorial matchup, Mike Duggan wins the Metro Detroit region getting between 35.8% to 40.4% of the Metro vote. Below is the Metro Detroit matchup between Duggan, James and Benson:

Stevens Runs Stronger With Independent Voters Than El-Sayed or McMorrow

The chart below looks at each Democrat's race against Mike Rogers by party affiliation. Compared to Abdul El-Sayed and Mallory McMorrow, Haley Stevens runs better against Mike Rogers with Independent and Leaning GOP. El-Sayed trails by 22.7-points among independent voters compared to only 2.0-points for Stevens.
