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## METHODOLOGY

The Glengariff Group, Inc. conducted a survey of likely August 2026 Michigan Democratic Primary Election voters. The 500 sample, live operator telephone survey was conducted on April 17-19, 2026 and has a margin of error of +/-4.4% with a 95% level of confidence. 18.8% of respondents were contacted via landline telephone. 81.2% of respondents were contacted via cell phone telephone. This survey was commissioned by the Detroit Regional Chamber.

## KEY FINDINGS

### Sky High Motivation to Vote at 9.3; Under 40's Lag Older Voters

Democratic primary voters are motivated to vote at a 9.3 on a 10.0-point scale representing a very high motivation to vote in the August primary election.

Motivation to vote was above 9.1 among every demographic group except voters under the age of 40 who were at 8.7. Voters over the age of 55 are motivated to vote at a 9.5.

### Economy Tops Concerns of Likely August Democratic Voters

Voters were asked in an open-ended question is the most important issue facing Michigan right now.

38.4% of likely voters cited the economy or inflation. Inflation and costs were cited by 20.0% of likely voters while 18.4% said the economy and jobs. All responses above 4% are listed below.

Whitmer Deeply Popular at 93.1%

Gretchen Whitmer is viewed favorably by 93.1% of likely primary voters. Just 2.8% had an unfavorable view and 4.0% had no opinion of her.

Slotkin at 70.0% Favorable

Elissa Slotkin is viewed favorably by 70.0% of likely primary voters. 7.3% of primary voters hold an unfavorable opinion of her. 13.2% had no opinion of her. 9.5% of primary voters had not heard of Elissa Slotkin.

There was a noticeable bump in ‘unfavorable’ for Slotkin among respondents that call themselves Democratic Socialists.

62.6% of Dems Say Two-Party System Does Not Work for America

62.6% of likely voters said the two-party system does not work for America. Just 28.9% of Democratic primary voters said the two-party system does work.

Older Democratic voters were much more likely to say the two-party system works as compared to younger Democratic voters.

Classic democratic voters were twice as likely to say the two-party system works as compared to Democratic Socialist voters.

57.7% Say Democratic Party Has Different Values Than 20 Years Ago

Primary voters were asked if the Democratic Party does or does not have the same values as it had twenty years ago. By a margin of 30.8%-57.7%, Democratic primary voters say the party’s values are not the same as they were twenty years ago. 11.5% did not know.

The largest difference on this question was by age and race. Older voters and white voters were more likely to say the party’s values were the same.

15.0% Say Republicans Should Be Disqualified from Holding Office

Primary voters were asked if a Republican should or should not be automatically disqualified from office for running as a Republican. 74.1% of voters said they should not be disqualified. **15.0% said they should be disqualified.** 3.4% said it would depend on the Republican. 7.5% could not provide an answer.

### Benson Has Better Than 2-1 Name ID Advantage Over Swanson

Jocelyn Benson has 85.6% name identification among likely primary voters breaking 58.5% favorable to 3.0% unfavorable. 24.1% of voters have heard of her but have no opinion. 14.0% of likely democratic voters have not heard of her.

Among definite primary voters, Benson is viewed favorably by 62.5% of definite voters and unfavorably by 3.3%. 21.9% have no opinion of her while 12.4% have never heard of her.

Chris Swanson has just 36.4% name identification among likely primary voters breaking 11.3% favorable to 4.3% unfavorable. 20.8% of likely primary voters have heard of him but have no opinion. 63.2% of likely voters have not heard of him.

Among 'definite' primary voters, Swanson has just 35.4% name identification breaking 12.1% favorable to 5.0% unfavorable. 64.6% of definite primary voters have not heard of him.

### Dem Governor Primary Race Not Competitive with Benson Holding a 58-Point Lead

Jocelyn Benson leads the primary race by a margin of 66.0%-8.1% over Chris Swanson. 22.9% of likely voters were undecided in the race. 2.4% of likely voters volunteered that they would vote for Mike Duggan.

Among 'definite' primary voters Benson leads 68.9%-8.3%, with 19.2% undecided.

### El-Sayed Has Narrow Advantage in Name ID at 57.9%

Abdul El-Sayed narrowly leads the three candidates for US Senate in name identification with 57.9% name identification.

Among 'definite' voters his name identification is 60.1% breaking 26.6% favorable to 6.4% unfavorable, with 27.1% having no opinion. 39.4% of definite voters have not heard of him.

There is a clear difference in perceptions of El-Sayed among Democratic Socialist voters where 38.2% view him favorably.

El-Sayed is viewed favorably by 25.5% of white voters but only 14.9% of black voters.

El-Sayed has 54.7% name id in out-state breaking 19.6% favorable to 3.3% unfavorable. He has 60.2% name identification in Metro Detroit breaking 27.7% favorable to 7.2% unfavorable.

El-Sayed has 57.7% name id among white voters breaking 25.5%-4.1%.

El-Sayed has 55.4% name id among black voters breaking 14.9%-10.7%.

Stevens Name ID a Close Second at 55.7%

Haley Stevens has 55.7% name identification trailing Abdul El-Sayed by two-points in name id.

- 6.9% Unfavorable
- 21.3% No Opinion
- 43.9% Never Heard Of
- 0.4% Refused

Among ‘definite voters’ her name identification is 55.5% breaking 28.7% favorable to 7.8% unfavorable, with 19.0% having no opinion of her.

As with Abdul El-Sayed there is a clear difference based on the type of Democrat with Stevens viewed much more favorably among classic Democrats and her name id underwater among Democratic Socialists.

*Stevens has 74.0% name identification in Metro Detroit breaking 43.2% favorable to 9.2% unfavorable. But she has just 30.8% name identification in out-state breaking 6.1% favorable to 3.7% unfavorable.*

Stevens has 51.0% name identification among white voters breaking 24.3%-6.4%.  
Stevens has 64.5% name identification among black voters breaking **39.7%**-3.3%

#### McMorrow Name ID at 39.7%

Mallory McMorrow has 39.7% name identification trailing both El-Sayed and Stevens.

Among ‘definite voters’ her name identification is 40.2% breaking 21.6% favorable to 4.3% unfavorable, with 14.3% having no opinion of her.

Unlike El-Sayed and Stevens, there is minimal difference in how McMorro is viewed based on the type of Democrat.

The chart below compares her name identification by age bracket. McMorro has only 30.3% name identification among voters aged 65 and older.

McMorro has 45.2% name id in Metro Detroit breaking 22.6% favorable to 6.5% unfavorable. McMorro has 32.3% name identification in out-state breaking 14.0% favorable to 1.9% unfavorable.

McMorro has 39.4% name identification among white voters breaking 18.8%-3.5%.

McMorro has 37.1% name identification among black voters breaking 19.0%-4.1%.

**Stevens 24.9%, El-Sayed 22.9%, McMorrow 16.0% -- 36.0% Remain Undecided**

In a head-to-head matchup, 36.0% of likely Democratic voters remain undecided in the US Senate race.

Haley Stevens holds a very narrow lead on Abdul El-Sayed essentially showing a statistical toss-up with McMorrow trailing behind the other two.

Among ‘definite’ primary voters, Stevens continues her two-point lead with McMorrow gaining two points to bring all three candidates within 7.4 points.

The race shows clear pathways among all three candidates with Stevens focused on Metro Detroit, black, older and non-college voters. El-Sayed draws heavily from out-state, Democratic Socialists, college educated, white and younger voters. McMorrow attracts voters in the 40-64 age bracket, but draws support relatively equally from all demographics.

The union vote appears to be a close race between El-Sayed and Stevens. Stevens dominates Metro Detroit but appears particularly weak in out-state regions of the state.

There are crucial age differences in the race with El-Sayed dominating younger voters. But Stevens has big leads among voters in the 55-64 bracket and particularly with voters over the age of 65.

Regionally, Stevens’ narrow lead is built on her support in Oakland, Macomb and non-Detroit, Wayne County. El-Sayed has stronger support in West, Southwest and Northern Michigan.

An important note: Regions produce small cell sizes creating a significantly larger margin of error per region. But the pattern of these regions provides an interesting roadmap being pursued by each campaign.

Democratic primary voters were presented with eight potential Democratic Presidential contenders and asked who they would support to be the Democratic nominee for President in 2028.

Voters under 40 chose Whitmer at 27.2%.
