METHODOLOGY

The Glengariff Group, Inc. conducted a survey of likely August 2026 Michigan Republican Primary Election voters. The 500 sample, live operator telephone survey was conducted on April 21-24, 2026 and has a margin of error of +/-4.4% with a 95% level of confidence. 21.0% of respondents were contacted via landline telephone. 79.0% of respondents were contacted via cell phone telephone. This survey was commissioned by the Detroit Regional Chamber.

KEY FINDINGS

Republicans Have High Motivation to Vote at 9.4; MAGA Vote More Motivated Than Classic Republicans

Republican primary voters are motivated to vote at a 9.4 on a 10.0-point scale representing a high motivation to vote in the August primary election.

But there is an interesting difference by the type of Republican. 31.3% of voters call themselves MAGA Republicans and say they are more supporters of Donald Trump with 90.5% saying they *definitely* plan to vote. But 58.4% consider themselves more classic Republicans with only 79.0% saying they *definitely* plan to vote.

MAGA Republicans are motivated at 9.6. But Classic Republicans were still motivated highly at 9.3. The combination of these two measures shows that Classic Republicans are slightly less committed to voting in August at this stage than MAGA Republicans.

Economy Tops Concerns of Likely August Republican Voters

Voters were asked in an open-ended question what is the most important issue facing Michigan right now. 25.2% of voters cited the economy or inflation. The economy and jobs were cited by 13.5% of likely voters. Inflation and costs were cited by 11.7% of likely voters.

16.8% of likely voters said the most important issue facing Michigan was getting rid of Governor Whitmer and Republicans taking control.

All responses above 4% are listed below:

- 13.5% The Economy and jobs
- 11.7% Inflation/ Cost of gas and goods
- 11.7% Taxes and government spending
- 8.7% Whitmer/ State government
- 8.5% Roads/ Infrastructure
- 8.1% Democrats/ Getting Republican control
- 6.1% Corrupt/Divisive Government
- 4.2% Immigration/ Border Security

85.9% View Trump Favorably

Donald Trump is viewed favorably by 85.9% of likely GOP primary voters. 9.1% had an unfavorable opinion of Donald Trump and 4.4% had no opinion of him.

Among definite voters, Trump is viewed favorably 87.8%-7.4%. But amongst probable voters, Trump is viewed favorably 77.3%-**17.0%**.

100% of MAGA Republicans view Donald Trump favorably. *But just 79.0% of Classic Republicans view Donald Trump favorably with 13.9% viewing him unfavorably.*

There are also interesting age differences with younger GOP voters more unfavorable than older GOP voters.

Rogers Has 87.1% Name Identification; 51.3% Favorable

Mike Rogers has 87.1% name identification breaking 51.3% favorable to 6.5% unfavorable. 29.3% have no opinion of him. He has stronger favorable ratings in Metro Detroit than in out-state Michigan.

54.5% of GOP Say Two-Party System Does Not Work for America

54.5% of GOP primary voters say the two-party system does not work for America. 41.2% of GOP primary voters say the two-party system does work.

Older Republican voters were considerably more likely to say the two-party system worked as compared to younger GOP voters.

Republican Voters Split on Whether Party Has Same Values As 20 Years Ago

Primary voters were asked if the Republican Party does or does not have the same values it had twenty years ago. By a margin of 47.3%-43.8%, Republican voters were statistically split. 8.9% of voters did not know.

Older voters, non-college and evangelical voters were more likely to believe the GOP had the same values as 20 years ago.

17.0% Say Democrats Should Be Disqualified from Holding Office; 25.3% of MAGA GOP and 21.2% of Men

Primary voters were asked if a Democrat should or should not be automatically disqualified from office for running as a Democrat. 74.5% of voters said they should not be disqualified. **But 17.0% said Democrats should be disqualified.** 2.0% said it would depend.

25.3% of MAGA Republicans believe all Democrats should be disqualified. 21.2% of GOP men believe Democrats should be disqualified.

James Leads in Name ID, Favorability Among Gubernatorial Candidates

Among the five candidates for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, John James has both the highest name identification and the highest favorability rating.

James Holds 17-Point Lead, But Johnson Gaining Ground Among Over 65, MAGA Voters

John James holds a 17-point lead against the rest of the Republican field taking 37.0% of the vote. Perry Johnson comes in second taking 19.8% of the vote. [Note: At the time of data collection, Tom Leonard was still a candidate in the race and is included.]

Among ‘definite’ primary voters, James leads Johnson by a margin of 36.9%-20.4%, with 15.8% undecided.

Among MAGA Republicans, James leads 35.4%-24.1% -- a lead of 11.3%. Among Classic Republican, James leads 39.3%-18.6% -- a lead of 20.7%.

Among the extremely important block of voters over the age of 65, James leads 36.3%-24.0% -- a lead of 12.3%. Mike Cox is drawing strong support from voters under the age of 54 compared to Johnson.

James draws consistently throughout the state’s nine different regions. Johnson draws his highest numbers in the UP/North and Oakland County. Cox draws his strongest support from Oakland and Wayne counties. Nesbitt’s support comes from Southwest and Mid-Michigan.

The undecided vote continues to be large in out-state Michigan – particularly west, southwest, mid and east central regions.

41.8% More Likely to Support a Candidate with Trump Endorsement – 27.5% MUCH MORE LIKELY

Likely voters were asked if they would be more or less likely to support a candidate for the Republican nomination if they had Donald Trump’s endorsement. By a margin of 41.8%-5.0%, voters would be more likely. But just 27.5% would be much more likely. 48.3% of voters said Trump’s endorsement would have no impact on them.

Among MAGA Republicans, 62.7% would be more likely to vote for a Trump endorsed candidate with 41.8% much more likely. Among Classic Republicans just 29.8% would be more likely to vote for a Trump endorsed candidates with just 19.3% much more likely. 7.4% of Classic Republicans would be less likely to vote for a Trump endorsed candidates. 57.3% said it would have no impact on them.

A Trump endorsement would carry the most weight with voters over the age of 55 – but minimal weight with voters under the age of 55.
